
# London Eye

Blenheim palace is a monumental English country house situated in the civil parish of Blenheim near Woodstock , Oxfordshire, United Kingdom. The palace, one of England's largest houses, was built between 1705 and circa 1722. Blenheim palace was designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1987.



# Natural History Museum

The Natural History Museum in London is home to life and earth science specimens comprising some 80 million items within five main collections: botany, entomology, mineralogy, paleontology and zoology. It is one of three major museums on Exhibition Road in South Kensington, the others being the Science Museum and the Victoria and Albert Museum.



# Museum of London

The Museum of London documents the history of the English capital city from prehistoric to modern times. The museum is the largest urban history collection in the world, with more than six million objects. It hosts more than one million visitors each year.



# Tower Bridge

The drawbridge in London was built over the Thames. It was built in the Victorian style, designed in 1894 by Horace Jones. The entire bridge is 244 meters long. It weighs over 2,000 tons. Today is one of the most visited monuments in London.



# Oxford

Oxford is a city in the South East region of England and the county town of Oxfordshire. The city is known worldwide as the home of University of Oxford, the oldest University in the England- speaking world.



# Big Ben

Big Ben is the nickname for the Great Bell of the clock at the north end of the Palace of Westminster in London and is usually extended to refer to both the clock and the clock tower. The official name of the tower in which Big Ben is located was originally the Clock Tower, but it was renamed Elizabeth Tower in 2012 to mark the Diamond Jubilee of Elizabeth II.
